Avian Influenza: Update (12-May-2022)

- Bering Strait region -

Avian influenza has been confirmed in Alaska both in bald eagles (Unalaska) and Canada Geese (Anchorage). There was a recent report of 5-6 dead swans east of Nome (between Bluff / Golovin). Spring migration is underway and avian influenza is highly contagious among birds. In Nome, UAF Alaska Sea Grant and Kawerak Inc. ask for your help in reporting *any* dead or sick birds (ex. Staggering, approachable, clear liquid discharge from mouth, etc.).

SAFE HANDLING

While the risk of human infections with avian influenza viruses is low, be cautious when handling wild birds

- Utilize your traditional knowledge
- Keep your hunting and processing equipment clean
- Clean and pluck your catch outside or in a well ventilated area
- Do not harvest/handle sick birds or birds found dead
- Do not eat, drink, or smoke when processing birds
- Wear rubber gloves and wash your hands in warm soapy water
- Thoroughly cook meat and eggs

- Take photos or video using your cell phone and call in what you saw!
- Report date, location or GPS coordinates, species, number of birds.
